#### **Training seminar for new Messianic leaders July 2009**





Because of the interaction between ministries "Celebrate Messiah" (Australia) and "Beit Sar Shalom" (Germany) in the Far East of Russia, we decided to hold a seminar on Jewish evangelism in Moscow in July 2009. ## Jewish population in Russia

The estimated numbers of the **Jewish population in Russia vary** from several hundred thousands to 3 million people. The liberal criteria adopted in Russia enable its leaders to estimate the minimal sizes of congregation at 1,3-1,5 million people. (Russian Jewish Congress)
